1.1 Literature Review

- sources. Proper citations of the sources should be provided within the text.

34 **2. METHODOLOGY**

- 35 The methodology section should explain in detail the experiments, techniques, algorithms, data
- sampling used as applicable to the research done. In case of human and animal experiments, the
- 37 author should ensure that the work described has been carried out in accordance with The Code of
- 38 Ethics of the World Medical Association (Declaration of Helsinki) for experiments involving
- 39 humans. The manuscript should be in line with the Recommendations for the Conduct, Reporting,
- 40 Editing and Publication of Scholarly Work in Medical Journals and aim for the inclusion of
- 41 representative human populations (sex, age and ethnicity) as per those recommendations. The
- 42 terms sex and gender should be used correctly.
- 43 Authors should include a statement in the manuscript that informed consent was obtained for
- 44 experimentation with human subjects. The privacy rights of human subjects must always be
- 45 observed.

- 46 All animal experiments should comply with the <u>ARRIVE guidelines</u> and should be carried out in
- 47 accordance with the U.K. Animals (Scientific Procedures) Act, 1986 and associated guidelines, <u>EU</u>
- 48 <u>Directive 2010/63/EU for animal experiments</u>, or the National Research Council's <u>Guide for the</u>
- 49 Care and Use of Laboratory Animals and the authors should clearly indicate in the manuscript that
